Notes from Father Walsh...

Memorials to the Parish. Sometimes, people approach the parish priest and ask about memorial gifts to the parish. They wish to do something permanent, and have a small plaque placed on the item, to remember who it was donated for and to allow the memory of this person to be part of the prayers of the priest and the parish. I have an interest in a few items that would help our parish. The first is a monstrance. The one we have is adequate, but if anyone is interested, this may be a very worthy gift for the parish. Adrian Hamers Church Interiors is a New York company that I have done business with in the past. The monstrance I am thinking about can be found on their website (google Adrian Hamers) and go to the product list, and then monstrance. Product H-40 is the one I am looking at as a possibility for the parish.

A set of adoration candelabra would be a beautiful gift for the parish. Adrian Hamers product number I am thinking about is H-181G Gold 3 Light Candelabra. We would need two of them, so the cost will be very close to \$1,000.

I am looking for a vestment stand for the sacristy or sanctuary, to hang the chasuble or the cope I am using for Mass or Eucharistic Adoration. I haven't found one, but this is a needed item for us. If you've been to Eucharistic Adoration, you've likely noted how I place the cope on the first pew after exposition, while I am in the confessional. It's not very elegant. This may be an item that one of our woodworkers in the parish might be interested in fabricating. Let me know if you are interested.

An Advent Wreath is something someone might consider as a memorial. There are beautiful metal ones that would look nice in our sanctuary, either a table top version or a floor stand model.

A tabor would also be a nice memorial. This is a special stand on which we place the monstrance during adoration. On the Adrian Hamers site, it is listed as items H-156G Gold Tabor.

None of these items are essential, but if you are interested in a permanent gift to help bring greater beauty to our worship and to remember a loved one (memorials are special acts of charity done on behalf of another, usually deceased, through which we ask that our act of charity be applied to the soul of the one in whose memory it is given), these might be items of interest to you.

Veterans Remembrance. Thank you to Ardyce and Jim Fuhrman for organizing the Veterans remembrance this weekend. Veterans Day was Wednesday, November 11. Originally called Armistice Day, it commemorated the signing of the cessation of hostilities during the First World War. The armistice occurred on the 11th day of the 11th month at 11 o'clock, 1918, the Feast Day of St. Martin of Tours (he died in 397AD), patron of France and the first canonized saint of the Church who was not a martyr. My middle name is Martin—thank you Mom and Dad!
