



7 facts about the Wise Men you might not know

On Jan. 6, the Catholic Church celebrates the solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord. On that day we commemorate the "manifestation" of the expected Messiah, who reveals himself to all the peoples of humanity, represented by the Three Wise Men who arrived in Bethlehem from the East.

The Gospel according to St. Matthew tells us that "on entering the house they saw the child with Mary, his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh" (Mt 2:11).

Here are seven facts that perhaps you didn't know about the Three Wise Men and the Epiphany.

1. The Church celebrates three epiphanies.

The feast of the Three Kings is commonly called Epiphany, a word that in Greek means "manifestation" in the sense that God reveals himself and makes himself known.

However, the Church celebrates three manifestations of the life of Jesus as epiphanies: the Epiphany of the Magi from the East (manifestation to the pagans), the Epiphany of the Baptism of the Lord (manifestation to the Jews), and the Epiphany of the wedding at Cana (manifestation to his disciples).

2. It's believed to be the second-oldest feast day.

The feast of the Epiphany is one of the oldest Christian feast days, most likely the second after Easter. It began in the East and then came to the West in the fourth

century.

It is said that originally Christians commemorated the three epiphanies on the same date. In some Eastern Churches, they even gave this feast day the celebratory character of the birth of Christ, but this aspect was diminished when the Roman feast day of Christmas was added in the fourth century.

In the Middle Ages, the Epiphany gradually became known more as the feast of the Three Wise Men. Currently, the Catholic Church celebrates the three epiphanies at different times on the liturgical calendar.

3. A saint determined the date

Studies maintain that Epiphany was set for Jan. 6 because this day commemorated the birth of Aion, the patron god of Alexandria, who was related to the sun god. It was also because winter solstice was celebrated on the same date in Egypt since ancient times.

St. Eusebius of Caesarea and St. Jerome in the fourth century — as well as St. Epiphanius in the sixth century — stated that the kings arrived to see the child Jesus before he was 2 years old.

However, St. Augustine (354 AD - 430 AD) maintained in his Epiphany sermons that they arrived on the 13th day after the birth of the Lord — i.e. Jan. 6 on the current calendar.

4. Kings by tradition

St. Matthew, the only one in the Bible who mentions the Magi, explains that they were from "the East," an area that, for the Jews, was the territories of Arabia, Persia, or Chaldea. The easterners called doctors "magi."

"Magus" in the Persian language meant "priest," and precisely the magi ("magoi" in Greek) were a caste of Persian or Babylonian priests. They did not know divine revelation like the Jews, but they studied the stars in their desire to seek God.

Tradition called the wise men "kings" in reference to Psalm 72 (10-11), which proclaims: "The kings of the West and the islands will pay tribute to him. The kings of Arabia and Ethiopia will offer him gifts. "All kings will bow down before him and all nations will serve him."

This text is currently read in the U.S. Church as "May the kings of Tarshish and the islands bring tribute, the kings of Sheba and Seba offer gifts. May all kings bow before him, all nations serve him."

5. There could have been more than three

St. Leo the Great and St. Maximus of Turin in the fourth and fifth centuries,

respectively, speak of three magi, not because this was based on any tradition but perhaps because of the three gifts the evangelist describes.

In the first centuries there are pictorial representations in which two, four, six, and even eight magi appear. However, the oldest fresco of the adoration of the Magi dates back to the second century and is found in an arch of the Greek chapel in the Roman catacombs of Priscilla, and three appear there.

The Three Wise Men would have had material of a prophetic nature (some have suggested that they obtained it from an eastern Jewish community, such as that of Babylon) that allowed them to astronomically identify the birth of the "King of the Jews."

They may have been especially motivated to see him because at the time it was expected that there would come a universal ruler from Israel.

In his book "Jesus of Nazareth," Pope Benedict XVI explains: "We know from [Roman historians] Tacitus and Suetonius that speculation was rife at the time that the ruler of the world would emerge from Judah, an expectation that [the Jewish historian] Flavius Josephus applied to [the Roman emperor] Vespasian, thereby finding his way into the emperor's favor (cf. De Bello Judaico III, 399-408)."

6. The origin of their names, physiognomies, and gifts

The names of the Magi do not appear in the holy Scriptures, but tradition has assigned them some. In a Paris manuscript from the late seventh century they are called Bitisarea, Melchor, and Gataspa, but in the ninth century they began to be referred to as Balthazar, Melchior, and Gaspar.

Melchior is generally depicted as an old white man with a beard representing Europe. He offers the child gold in recognition of the kingship of Christ. Gaspar (also called Casper or Kasper) represents Asia and brings incense representing the divinity of Jesus. Balthazar is usually depicted with dark skin because he comes from Africa. He gives the Savior myrrh, a substance used to embalm corpses and symbolizes the humanity of the Lord.

At the time when the Magi began to be described with these characteristics, there was no knowledge of America. Furthermore, all three refer to the stages of human growth: youth (Gaspar), maturity (Balthazar), and old age (Melchior).

7. The star may have been a conjunction of planets

Several hypotheses have been built around the star of Bethlehem that the Three Wise Men saw. It was previously said that it was a comet, but astronomical studies indicate that it was apparently due to the conjunction in the sky of the planets Saturn and Jupiter in the constellation of Pisces.

Thus, the Magi possibly decided to travel in search of the Messiah because, in ancient astrology, Jupiter was considered the star of the prince of the world, the constellation of Pisces as the sign of the end times, and the planet Saturn in the East as the star of Palestine.

In short, it is presumed that the "wise men of the East" understood that the Lord of the end times would appear that year in Palestine.

It is likely that the Three Wise Men knew some messianic prophecies of the Hebrew people and that is why they came to Jerusalem, to Herod's palace, asking for the king of the Jews.

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Today is the <u>Feast of the Epiphany</u>, when Western Christians celebrate the visit of the Magi to the infant Jesus. The account of the visit of the Magi can be found in <u>Matthew 2:1-18</u>. According to Scripture, "wise men from the East" followed a star to Jesus' location and then "fell down and worshipped him" (Matt. 2:11).

The traditional belief that there were three wise men is a development based on the gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh recorded in Matthew 2:11. The identification of the wise men as kings may have developed from a reading of Psalm 72 that says, "May all kings fall down before him, all nations serve him" (v. 11).

Most Nativity scenes include the Magi, but we know from <u>Scripture</u> that they did not arrive until later. Some Bible scholars suggest that this may not have occurred until up to a year and a half later, based on King Herod's command in Matthew 2:16:

Then Herod, when he saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, was in a furious rage, and he sent and killed all the male children in Bethlehem and in all that region who were two years old or under, according to the time which he had ascertained from the wise men.

The fact that Herod had all the male children up to two years old killed suggests that some time had passed before he ascertained the age of the Christ child from the Magi. In any case, Matthew does not tell us exactly how much time elapsed between the birth of Jesus and their arrival.

According to the website <u>religoustolerance.org</u>: "The Egyptian God Horus was born of the virgin Isis; as an infant, he was visited by three kings." Of Hercules, Osiris, Bacchus, Mithras, Hermes, Prometheus, Perseus, and Horus, the site claims all of them had been "visited by 'wise men' during infancy." In classic popular mythicist fashion, there are no primary source citations to back up these claims.

As I have already pointed out, Matthew's Gospel is silent on the number and political status of the Magi. These are later developments in Christian tradition and not a matter of Gospel record. Because we know that these traditions arose from biblical inferences, we can say with confidence that they have nothing to do with pagan mythology.

Furthermore, of the pagan deities mentioned above, none of them was visited by three wise men or kings. The burden of proof is with the mythicists, and they will be hard pressed to deliver anything credible.

Some mythicists will also claim that, like Jesus' birth, the births of certain pagan gods were heralded by a star in the east. Mythicist author and blogger <u>D.M.</u> <u>Murdock writes</u>, "Rather than representing a 'historical' event surrounding the birth of a Jewish messiah, the star at the coming of the savior can be found in the myths of Egypt."

Of the Magi, Pope Benedict XVI explains that it is possible these men were part of a Persian priesthood, or they could have been something else (see Jesus of Nazareth: The Infancy Narratives, p. 94). Whoever they were, they were probably not Jewish. This point is significant, because even if there were a parallel here with some pagan god and the birth of Jesus, it makes sense that the Magi would recognize a sign familiar to them and respond to it. But there are no pagan parallels.

Some mythicists attempt to connect Sothis—a star that the ancient Egyptians believed to be significant—to the birth of Horus. However, this can be achieved only through a series of rigorous mental gymnastics.

The Egyptians most often connected the rising of Sothis (AKA Sirius) to the rising level of the Nile River, which was very important to them. The flooding of the Nile brought with it fertile soil necessary for farming (see the Oxford Guide to Egyptian Mythology, p. 256). In the astral realm, the goddess Isis was sometimes identified with Sothis, and her husband, Osiris, was identified with the constellation Orion. Their sexual union was said to have produced Horus (Oxford Guide, p. 171). Even if Jesus were an astrological deity as some mythicists claim, there is still no parallel here.

The other "star in the east" parallel claims are met with the same obstacle: little to no evidence. There are other accounts from antiquity that appeal to astrological events as a sign of some spiritual significance, but none of them plays out like the story of Jesus' birth and the visit of the Magi.

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How to bless your home on the feast of Epiphany 2024

Have you ever walked past a door & seen what appears to be random letters & numbers written at the top? These letters & numbers actually

have a great significance.

Traditionally on the feast of Epiphany, Catholics bless their homes by writing the letters C, M, & B & the

numbers of the year on either side - so this year it would look like "20+C+M+B+24."

The letters stand for the tradtional names of the 3 Magi: Caspar, Melchior, & Balthasar. They also represent the Latin blessing "Christus mansionem benedicat," which means "May Christ bless this house."

Many Catholic parishes will give their parishioners a piece of chalk, a small bottle of holy water, & the words for the house blessing so that each family can bless its home.

Epiphany, which is also known as "Little Christmas," is the feast that celebrates the arrival of the three Magi who had come to worship the Child Jesus shortly after his birth. It is traditionally celebrated on Jan. 6. However, in the United States, in the Novus Ordo, it is celebrated on the Sunday between Jan. 2 & Jan 8. Many around the world celebrate this feast with as much pomp & circumstance as Christmas, including the exchanging of gifts.

The blessing, which is popular in Poland & other Slavic countries, has spread around the world & is becoming increasingly popular in the United States. This article was originally published Jan. 6, 2022, & was updated Jan. 5, 2024.



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How do you bless your home? This is a special tradition at the beginning of each year, a way to invite God into your home & place your family under his protection.

Begin by having all family members gather outside the front door. All make the sign of the cross. One person will then read this prayer:

Priest/Leader: Peace be to this house.

All: And to all who dwell herein.

Leader: From the east came the Magi to Bethlehem to adore the Lord; & opening their treasures they offered precious gifts: gold for the great King, incense for the true God, & myrrh in symbol of his burial.

Enter your home & read the Magnificat, the hymn of praise sung by the Blessed Virgin Mary in Luke's Gospel after being greeted by Elizabeth.

During this, sprinkle the area you are in with holy water.

The Magnificat - The Prayer Of Mary (Lk 1: 46-55) My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord, my spirit rejoices in God my Savior for he has looked with favor on his lowly servant. From this day all generations will call me blessed: the Almighty has done great things for me, & holy is his Name.

He has mercy on those who fear him in every generation. He has shown the strength of his arm, he has scattered the proud in their conceit. He has cast down the mighty from their thrones, & has lifted up the lowly.

He has filled the hungry with good things, & the rich he has sent away empty.

He has come to the help of his servant Israel for he remembered his promise of mercy, the promise he made to our fathers, to Abraham & his children forever.

After that is complete:

All: From the east came the Magi to Bethlehem to adore the Lord; & opening their treasures they offered precious gifts: gold for the great King, incense for the true God, & myrrh in symbol of his burial.

Leader: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, & forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead & lead us not into temptation, All: But deliver us from evil.

Leader: All they from Saba shall come

All: Bringing gold & frankincense.

All: And let my cry come unto Thee.

Leader: O Lord, hear my prayer.

Leader: Let us pray. O God, who by the guidance

of a star didst on this day manifest Thine onlybegotten Son to the Gentiles, mercifully grant that we who know Thee by faith may also attain the vision of Thy glorious majesty. Through Christ. Our Lord. All: Amen.

Leader: Be enlightened, be enlightened, O Jerusalem, for thy light is come, & the glory of the Lord is risen upon thee — Jesus Christ born of the Virgin Mary.

All: And the Gentiles shall walk in thy light & kings in the splendor of thy rising, & the glory of the Lord has risen upon thee.

Leader: Let us pray. Bless, O Lord God almighty, this home, that in it there may be health, purity, the strength of victory, humility, goodness, & mercy, the fulfillment of Thy law, the thanksgiving to God the Father & to the Son & to the Holy Spirit. And may this blessing remain upon this home & upon all who dwell herein. Through Christ, Our Lord. All: Amen.

After the prayers are recited, walk throughout your home sprinkling each room with holy water. Then write the initials of the Magi connected with crosses at the top of your front door. Then the **numbers of the year**. The numbers will be split so that they are on each side of the initials. You will write:

20 + C + M + B + 24
